

Understanding Program Improvement

Under the Federal Elementary Secondary Education Act (ESEA)

As part of the federal requirements under Title 1 Program, Rocklin Unified School District will remain designated as a Program Improvement school district, Year I. However, given Rocklin's high achievement, this might seem confusing on the surface to parents and community members.

Here is some information to put PI status in context:

As part of receiving federal dollars, districts are required to show adequate yearly progress on test scores.

Under this federal legislation, all schools must show academic improvement each year in English-language arts and mathematics as measured by the state achievement tests – the current target is 100% of our students must be proficient. Not only must the overall school demonstrate growth, but every “subgroup” that makes up the school must meet this proficiency rate. These subgroups include but are not limited to socially/economically disadvantaged, students receiving special education and students acquiring English as a second language. Due to this legislation Rocklin Unified School District will remain in Year 1 Program Improvement even though the school district made all AYP components in the 2015 APR Reports.

How can parent/guardians help their school and LEA improve?

Here are some suggestions to help you work with your school and LEA to support improvements:
